How we understand the negative may determine whether it sabotages the process of psychoanalytic psychotherapy or serves as an engine of therapeutic action. Transference, counter-transference, and projective identification, for example, initially conceived as subverting the effectiveness of psychoanalytic psychotherapy, have been reconceived as vehicles of unconscious communication between patient and analyst and engines of therapeutic action.

Immersion in the negative expands the therapist's awareness of the patient's internal world. "Negative capability" affords the therapist internal space to deliberate alternative perspectives in the complex field of here-and-now work with patients. The sleep of enactments may precede the awakening of understanding.

This year's intensive study groups will investigate theoretical approaches to the negative and practical engagements with it in the clinical setting. The syllabus will include films and plays that illustrate course themes. Explore with our experienced instructors how apparent challenges to psychotherapy may vitally contribute to the process of human transformation.

The frenetic pace of agency work in community mental health makes finding time and space to think deeply about our work difficult. With the pressures of documentation requirements, community trauma, and limited resources, these demands overshadow clinical thinking. In response to the needs of our community, NCSPP is providing an additional forum to reflect on our clinical work. We are offering two consultation groups: one focused on clinical work, the other on supervisory work.

The clinical consultation group will process clinical work by licensed or unlicensed employees of county-funded or non-profit agencies. The supervisory group will support new CMH agency supervisors thinking more about the supervisory relationship.

These consultation groups will be led by seasoned clinicians who have experience in community settings.

In response to participants from “Locating Unrepresented Thought” in Spring 2017, we’re elaborating on the interrelationship between intersubjectivity, unrepresented states, and unsymbolized thought and offering more clinical examples of the extended use of the analyst’s mind. We will talk about a relational, intersubjective view whereby thoughts are made from the interactions between subjects. We draw from Ferenczi’s semiotics theory (Aron and Harris, 1997), delineating the progression of symbolization from action to thought: when the capacity for thought is disrupted, the internal object is present as an unsymbolized object in an unrepresented state. The analytic collision with the unsymbolized is then taken up by Ferenczi (1932) and Botella and Botella (2005). We will discuss their emphasis on the importance of making an extended use of the analyst’s mind, such as “working as a double.”

The goal of this course is to introduce students to the theoretical and clinical relevance of Freud's notion of infantile sexuality, which remains revolutionary and radical even after more than a hundred years. We start with the second of Freud's *Three Essays on the Theory of Sexuality*, where he discusses sexuality in infancy and childhood. We will read a new English translation of Freud's 1905 original German text of a "non-Oedipal" and potentially non-heteronormative psychoanalysis, along with Strachey's translation that incorporates Freud's later editions and rewritings. We will then discuss the manifestations of the sexual in the clinical situation, including the destinies/fates of the sexual drive, erogenous zones, the object, and the transference, with a consideration of sexual stages and afterwardsness (*après-coup*). We will focus on specific basic concepts and their usefulness in our everyday clinical work, with ample room for discussion.

Furthering the discourse begun in Sue Saperstein's 2016 NCSPP Course "Difference Matters!," four individual clinicians commit to speak to the inclusion and clash of radical differences. This dialogue, facilitated by four racially and culturally dissimilar voices, will bring forward the theoretical, historical, and philosophical disparities in our current climate. Our practice of speech is intended to open a necessary, ethical discourse so as to keep learning from the Other and our Otherness.

The framework for this workshop will include discussion of culturally relevant readings from psychoanalysis, journalism, and literature as a way to speak of the underrepresented/unseen, and the challenges of psychic citizenship in its relation to power. We will work and move together to find an analytic position that addresses the painful gaps between psychoanalysis and lived experience, as they surface in the clinic and the classroom.

In this seminar, we will explore various psychoanalytic contributions that can enhance our understanding of the totalitarian states of mind that spark these dangerous movements. We will consider how omnipotence and grandiosity can take over the personality, obviating guilt and trumping healthy uncertainty, which leads to the formation of psychotic-like totalitarian states of mind. We will consider racism and propaganda as they relate to these states — marked by narcissistic, perverse, and psychopathic features. We will consider these tyrannical states at the individual and the group level by discussing selected readings by Hannah Arendt, Herbert Rosenfeld, Christopher Bollas, Janine Chasseguet-Smirgel, Roger Money-Kyrle, and by the instructor.

Diane Borden, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus of Film and Literature, former Director of Film Studies, and former Chair of English at the University of the Pacific. She has published books, chapters, and journal articles on cinema and psychoanalysis and given papers and workshops at professional conferences in the U.S., Europe, and Asia. Dr. Borden conducts study groups on film and psychoanalysis in San Francisco and the South Bay and has been a guest faculty at SFCP.

Stephanie Z. Chen, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist and faculty at the Wright Institute. As a bicultural psychologist, she addresses race, gender, immigration, acculturation, and the tension of navigating between conflicting worlds. Her interests include ethnic/cultural identity formation and the integration of relational psychodynamic theories with a multicultural, social justice lens.

Shawnee Cuzzillo, Ph.D., is a psychoanalytically oriented psychologist, seeing individuals and couples in private practice in Albany. Dr. Cuzzillo has taught at the graduate level on biological bases of behavior, psychodynamic psychotherapy, and couple psychotherapy. A graduate of UC Berkeley, MIT, The Wright Institute, and the PCPG training program, she supervises students in her private practice and at various community agencies. Dr. Cuzzillo has published articles on the evolutionary basis for psychopathology and maintains an active art practice.

Milena Edwards, Psy.D., grew interested in film as an undergraduate at UC Berkeley where she majored in Rhetoric and Film Studies. Her interest continued throughout graduate school, choosing Michael Haneke's film *The Piano Teacher* to explore the use of perverse defenses within narcissistic object relationships in her dissertation. When not enjoying the latest arthouse film, she divides her time between private practice in Oakland and her work as incoming Director of Training at Access Institute for Psychological Services.

Sam Gerson, Ph.D., is a founder and past president of NCSPP and PINC, where he is faculty and a personal and supervising analyst. Dr. Gerson is an associate editor of *Psychoanalytic Dialogues* and an editor for *Studies in Gender and Sexuality and Psychoanalytic Quarterly*.

Rose Gupta, Psy.D., LCSW, is a psychoanalyst and consultant in San Francisco and a member of PINC. Since 2007, she has presented papers on trauma, unrepresented states, and nonsymbolic objects at IPA, IARPP, IPFE, Division 39 of APA. Her latest paper, "Finding Frankenstein," was presented at the 2018 Sandor Ferenczi Conference in Florence, Italy.

David Hewison, Ph.D., holds a doctorate in Couple Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy from Tavistock Relationships, where he is a Consultant Couple Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist and Head of Research. He is a training analyst for the Society of Analytical Psychology and an associate member of the APA's Society for the Advancement of Psychotherapy (Division 29). Dr. Hewison has published extensively and teaches internationally. He has a particular interest in creativity and imagination and in linking Jungian and psychoanalytic perspectives. In 2010 he was commissioned by the UK's National Health Service to develop an integrative behavioural model of couple therapy for use in the treatment of depression.

Betsy Kassoff, Ph.D., is a licensed clinical psychologist in San Francisco. She was the Clinical Director of Operation Concern, a GLBT outpatient counseling clinic, and the Department Chair of the Feminist Psychology MA program at New College of California. Dr. Kassoff sees individuals and couples from diverse backgrounds in her private practice, provides consultation, supervises, teaches, and writes on the intersection of relational psychoanalysis and gender. She is an advanced candidate at PINC.

Israel Katz, M.D., is a member and faculty at SFCP. He has taught on Freud and psychoanalysis in France, Spain, and Latin America and, more locally, at SFCP, NCSPP, and Access Institute. Dr. Katz has a private practice in psychoanalysis, psychotherapy, and psychiatry in San Francisco.

Jimena Martí-Haik, M.A., is a psychoanalyst from Mexico City. She majored in Latin American Literature and Literary Criticism and has a Master's degree in Psychoanalytic Theory. A trained analyst, she has a private practice and has worked in psychiatric institutions. Her interest is the intersection of cultural productions, social discourses, and subjectivity.

Megan Rundel, Ph.D., is a graduate of PINC who has taught widely in the Bay Area psychoanalytic community. She is also a Zen teacher at the Crimson Gate Meditation Community. Dr. Rundel has special interests in sexuality, spirituality, and the body in psychoanalysis. She has a private practice in Oakland.

Sue Saperstein, MFT, Psy.D., has been a psychoanalyst, educator, and community activist for 45 years in San Francisco. She is faculty and supervisor at SFCP, NCSPP, CPMC, and CAPA and has focused on the evolving psychoanalytic treatment of trauma, sexualities, culture, immigration, and now elder development. In 2006, she published "Psychoanalytic Justice: An Ethical Inquiry" in *The Psychoanalytic Review*.

Drew Tillotson, Psy.D., is past-president of PINC and NCSPP, co-chair of the North American Psychoanalytic Confederation (NAPsAC), and sits on the IPA's Committee on Education and Oversight. He has published on masculinity, aging, and intercultural phenomena; teaches widely in the Bay Area; and is in private practice in San Francisco.

Andrea Walt, Ph.D., is a faculty member and personal and supervisory analyst at PINC. She teaches theory and clinical practice in a variety of training settings. Dr. Walt has a private practice in Oakland, California, offering psychoanalysis and psychotherapy for adults, adolescents, and couples.

Nikkia Young, Ph.D., is a psychologist and former classroom teacher and instructor at CSPP. Her areas of clinical focus include trauma, parenting, adolescence, and early childhood. In addition to running the Counseling Department at Lick-Wilmerding High School in San Francisco, Dr. Young provides trainings and consultation on equity, literacy, classroom management, and mental health.
